b. Balance south coast regional perspective with localized knowledge

Serving as a scientific/range management consultant (2001 – present) to Commander Pacific Fleet (2004 - 2007) and Fleet Area Control and Surveillance Facility San Diego (FASCFAC) San Diego (Range Complex Support Department), Ms. Marshall has had to ensure a strong balance between federal environmental regulations and State initiatives/mandates with local operational training requirements, public use priorities, and natural resource management agency (US Fish and Wildlife Service and National Marine Fisheries Association) priorities for federal and State listed species.

c. Express fundamental interests and convey interests of one or more stakeholder groups

Ms. Marshall has a comprehensive understanding of the Navy's training range requirements for conducting unit level through advanced level training in Southern

California's offshore waters. Her ongoing involvement in the development of environmental documentation and regulatory consultation coupled with her understanding of fleet training range requirements and range sustainment uniquely qualifies her to represent naval training requirements in Southern California. She has worked extensively with public interest groups (including the San Diego Sports Fishing Association) and other federal agencies (United States Coast Guard) in the coordination of fleet training range requirements.

d. Work collaboratively, seeking to integrate the interests of a full range of constituents

Ms Marshall's strength is her ability to assemble an interdisciplinary team of subject matter experts to work collaboratively and successfully for an end goal. Supporting Commander Pacific Fleet and in her current position with FACSFAC Range Complex Support Department, she has spearheaded the collaboration of multiple integrated teams, including (but not limited to): ocean engineers, marine mammal researchers, and operational commands for the VSW Underwater Explosives Training at San Clemente Island and Silver Strand: Research and Report of Findings; Navy task force for Composite Training Unit Exercises (COMPTUEX) and Joint Task Force Exercises (JTFEX) California Coastal Commission Consistency Determination; Mine Warfare Training Range Requirements in Southern California; Southern California Anti-Submarine Warfare Range (SOAR) Cable Refurbishment Environmental Assessment (EA)/Overseas EA Integrated Product Team (IPT); and public scoping, outreach, and resource stakeholder interview teams for Silver Strand Training Complex Environmental Impact Statement.
